A MESSAGE FROM RABBI GABI



Last Tuesday, as the horrific news of widespread terrorist attacks in Israel across the world, my wife Mushka called me in a panic.

"I'm getting messages that one of our relatives has been killed by Hamas in the South. Which one of our cousins is it?"

I got the shock of my life. Together, we did a quick run through of all our cousins.

"What's the name of the cousin that's been killed?" I asked her, feeling a little scared.

"Adi," said Mushka. Together, on the phone, we named all our cousins. My dad's cousins. Mushka's dad's cousins. Our second cousins. Even some of our more distant cousins. We couldn't figure it out.

"Must have been a mistake," I said, half hopeful, half praying that it was not true.

Yet, later in the day, it became clear. It was Mushka's cousin, Adi Vital-Kaploun, a relative of hers through her father's family.

My wife is a descendent of Rabbi Moshe Zalman and Leah Feiglin, who in 1913 emigrated from Israel to Australia and quickly became pillars of the Jewish Community in Shepparton.

Today, they have so many descendants.

There are many Feiglins in Australia and around the world but when one meets another family member, there is a sense of connection and kindship.

The conversation always starts with how you're actually are related in the wide web of the family and we share family stories of Moshe Zalman and Leah, and how proud they would be of the dynasty that lives on.

Although I never met Adi Vital-Kaploun, I feel close to my Feiglin cousins. Just two months ago, in Melbourne, there was a Feiglin family reunion with close to 100 people, many branches of the family and a lively discussion sharing memories from all branches of the family.

And like all Jews, I don't need to know someone personally to feel close to them. Jewish people number only 15 million people in the world, and our relationships are usually only one degree separated, with it impossible not to feel the pain on the pictures coming out of

Southern Israel.

As Tuesday wore on, we were informed, that despite the darkness emerging from Israel, there was a silver lining. Adi's two children, Negev and Eshel, originally kidnapped by Hamas, for unexplained reasons, were released along with a neighbour on the border to Gaza, in the middle of no-man's land. Four-year-old Negev, who was shot in the leg, and his brother Eshel have now been reunited with their father Anani, Mushka's cousin.

It's a tragic set of circumstances, compounded by the fact that these young children have cruelly lost their mother, and the <u>video</u> of their unexplained dumping was used by Hamas to prove that they do not harm "women and children."

Aside from the lies inherent to this statement, I felt a pang of deep sorrow for these small children who will grow up without their mother, and the legacy of being part of one the worst terrorist attack in Israel's history.

No doubt, it's a terrible time for many.

And here in Melbourne, it is compounded by the fact that this tragedy has hit so close to home not just for my family but for so many others.

What does one say? How does one comfort a family who has been through such a horrific experience? How do I explain to my children that their cousin was murdered by a terrorist organisation, who also shot their four-year-old cousin?

How do I support my relatives? How do I speak to my congregation about this tragedy?

As a rabbi I am already inundated with congregants who are feeling immense grief and uncertainty about the existential threat that Israel is facing.

There are no clear cut answers, but our tradition gives us a response

In the midst of our pain, it is crucial to find strength and inspiration. Our Jewish heritage teaches us the value of resilience, hope, and the pursuit of justice and responsibility to one another.

It is in our collective memory that we find the stories of our parents, grandparents and those that came before us who endured unimaginable hardships and remained steadfast in their faith and commitment to their people.


