

A MESSAGE FROM RABBI GABI



It's no secret that the past few months have been a challenging time for Jewish people around the world including Australia. As the children and grandchildren of Holocaust survivors, we are steadfast in our gratitude to this country for letting in our parents and grandparents. They came here to seek refuge, and found a tolerant and multicultural society, one where they could be their full Jewish selves alongside their friends and neighbours.

Since October 7th, the feeling of security here has been a little more tenuous. Suddenly, it feels that Australia, despite it historically being one of the most tolerant and multicultural societies in the world for Jews, has regressed. We are seeing swastikas daubed on our synagogues and buildings. We are seeing unrest in our neighbourhoods.

The boycott of Jews for being "Zionist" is widespread in the arts and cultural festivals. And some of our dearest multicultural partners, with whom we have fostered longstanding relationships have not been there to support Jewish people during this tough time. As a rabbi who has long been invested in multiculturalism and interfaith work, I would be lying if I would say I have not been shocked and hurt.

Jewish people in Australia have forever been on the forefront of social movements demanding change for those that are marginalised, or experiencing disadvantage. Our community is steadfast in our commitment to a more fair, just and equitable Australia, one where the voices of indigenous people, refugees, and all those that want to be part of this glorious nation are given the chance.

It isn't perfect, but it has certainly been a golden age. One where Jewish people never doubted their place, and always felt safe. And yet, since October 7th, I think a lot about whether we are living past the peak of the golden age? Has Australia become less tolerant of its Jews?

On one hand, I can emphatically see that the Australian Government has strengthened legislation that would protect people from doxing, and has shown a deep commitment to providing security to our community. But yet, I worry that perhaps what was once a fringe ideology of blaming Jews for the problems in society, has grown into antisemitism that is rearing its head in earnest right here, becoming mainstream.

I know when my grandfather came to Australia, in the shadows of the Holocaust, he came here because he wanted to get away from the antisemitism and fear that had stalked European Jews for millennia.

I'd like to believe that the golden age of this country is not yet over. I retain faith in the State and Federal Governments who have shown that they receive feedback from our community and take our recommendations seriously. I have received many personal letters and emails from other faith leaders, appalled at the treatment of Jews in light of October 7th. But more than that, I retain faith that decent Australians do not stand for Jew hatred, or any other type of discrimination.

I know too well that the loudest voices make the most noise, but do not speak for the majority of us. Aussies want to live in peace and security, retain their Australian way of life, and ensure that all people feel safe, Jews included.

As we contemplate the challenges facing the Jewish community at home and around the world, it's particularly poignant to acknowledge the timing of our current reflections amidst the observance of the Fast of Esther (commemorated today as we don't fast on Friday or Shabbat), and the upcoming celebration of Purim.

Purim commemorates the deliverance of the Jewish people from the genocidal plot orchestrated by Haman, an archetypal antisemite whose name has echoed through the annals of history. As we prepare to celebrate the triumph of good over evil, it's a sobering reminder that the scourge of antisemitism has persisted across generations. In light of the record high numbers of antisemitic incidents, and the struggles our community faces, these moments of introspection during Purim take on added significance. Just as Esther and Mordechai bravely confronted the forces of hatred and intolerance, so too must we draw strength from our collective heritage to combat antisemitism in all its forms, ensuring that the spirit of Purim continues to inspire resilience, solidarity, and hope for a brighter future.


