

A MESSAGE FROM RABBI GABI



This week we read Parshat Vaykahel. The people of Israel are offered a once in a lifetime opportunity: to contribute from their own freewill and generosity anything they would like to help construct the Mishkan (Tabernacle). Famously, while Moshe was expecting just a few donations, the level of generosity from the people of Israel was unprecedented!

The people were extremely generous, donating expensive items from gold and silver to precious stones and colored wools and clothing! The generosity of spirit takes Moshe by surprise, and he is soon inundated by the sheer number of donations so he tells the people of Israel to stop donating as he has more than enough.

As the rabbi of a synagogue, I can tell you that donations of this level would be an absolute dream! Usually fundraising is carefully planned out with set targets and goals to encourage people to help meet the funds needed.

However, in this week's Parsha we see what happens when people feel strongly to be generous and motivated by their desire to be part of the building of a Sanctuary for G-d's presence.

People give because they are inspired to be a part of this important cause, knowing that their contributions will help to create a communal space that will benefit every single person who is part of the people of Israel.

There is a myriad of reasons why people feel generous enough to be compelled to give.

Often, people will want to give to causes that are close to their hearts. If they have experienced the benefit of an organisation people may also feel inclined to give. Donors may also give because of historical reasons, such a connection to a parent or family members, which makes the cause enticing.

However, the Mishkan was inspired by the freewill of all the people of Israel.

The Jewish people were not obligated to give.

There was no expectation that there would be a minimum contribution. Rather, they were invited to contribute if they felt so inclined, knowing that their contribution would help create a Jewish future, one in which they had a central location for G-d to manifest in their midst.

Based on the generosity of the Jewish people, it's clear that they

thought this was an important cause.

While we know that G-d is always around us, sometimes it can be hard to visualise how that presence manifests, especially because humans are such visual beings.

It is for this reason that newspapers and magazines use artwork and photographs to accompany their articles.

Seeing a central location for G-d's dwelling solidified the visual that G-d was truly dwelling amongst the people. It's little wonder that so many people felt inclined to give!

The challenge for us in the 21st century is how to replicate this feeling of knowing that G-d is always amongst us, while knowing that we no longer have a central location where we can see those visual reminders.

It's the reason that we have in-built times of reflection such as Shabbat. They help to remind us of G-d's presence in our lives each week!

ALLIANCE AGAINST ANTISEMITISM in HEALTH CARE

We're a group of doctors who are concerned about the rise in antisemitism in the healthcare system. We created AAAHC – the Alliance Against Antisemitism in Health Care, in order to address this. We have done a pilot survey of over 150 health professionals and discovered that around a third have experienced antisemitism in the workplace, more than half are feeling as though they need to hide their Jewish identity in the workplace. A significant proportion of those who have experienced antisemitism feel unable to escalate it.

We are asking for your help in reaching a wider range of those working in the healthcare sector, particularly nursing and other allied health staff. We want to collate the results to be able to lobby politicians to effect real change in our hospital systems.

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


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
